APPLYING FOR A PENSION

COLLECTING YOUR PENSION

You can have your pension paid into your bank account or you can collect it from the Post Office. If you have any difficulties collecting your payment (i.e. through illness etc.) you can nominate someone to collect your pension on your behalf. Fill in an 'Agent Form' which is available at your local Post Office. Return that form to the Department of Social Protection, Pension Services Office, College Rd, Sligo.

AGE 80 ALLOWANCE

Pensioners receiving an Irish social welfare pension automatically receive a €10 increase in the personal rate of their pension when they reach the age of 80. The increase is only paid to the main claimant of the pension and not to the Oualified Adult.

SUPPLEMENTARY WELFARE PAYMENT

This payment is made available to persons who are not able to meet certain bills, including emergency situations. For example

- Heating Supplement to help with the cost of extra heating needs due to your age, medical condition or disability
- Exceptional Needs Payment to meet once off essential costs for example special clothing for a person who has a serious illness
- Urgent Needs Payment to pay for food or clothing in emergency situations such as following a fire or flood.

LIVING ALONE ALLOWANCE

Living alone allowance €9 made weekly to persons who are 66 years or live mainly alone, and who are in receipt of certain social welfare payments including state pensions.

SAFE REGISTRATION

SAFE registration, and the subsequent issue of a Public Services Card, have been introduced to protect people's identity and to help save time and effort in accessing a range of public services. You must authenticate your identity with the Department by undergoing SAFE registration when requested to do so.

HEALTH SERVICE EXECUTIVE (HSE)

The HSE provides health and social services to persons living in Ireland. The services provided include Occupational Therapy, Primary Care Teams, Public Health Nurse, Physiotherapy, Home Support.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

- The Public Health Nursing (PHN) service operated Monday to Friday and provides a range of supports e.g. Home clinical nursing care, post hospital care, dressings.
- The service acts as a guide to additional care and support by referral to Home support and Respite care, Day care and assessment for Nursing Home Care.
- The service makes referrals to other members of the multidisciplinary team such as GP, Physio, Occupational Therapy, Speech and Language Therapy and Dietician if required

KILKENNY COUNTY COUNCIL HOUSING AID FOR OLDER PEOPLE GRANT SCHEME

The Scheme of Housing Aid for Older People is available from Kilkenny County Council to assist older people living in poor housing conditions to have necessary repairs or improvements carried out. The types of works grant aided under the scheme include structural repairs or improvements, re-wiring, repairs to/replacement of windows and doors, the provision of heating, water and sanitary services.

The level of grant aid available is determined on the basis of gross household income and shall be between 30%-95% of the approved cost of the works to a maximum of €8,000. The grant is available to households whose gross annual household income does not exceed €60,000.

HOUSING ADAPTATION GRANT FOR A PERSON WITH A DISABILITY

This grant is available to assist in the carrying out of works which are reasonably necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability who has an enduring physical, sensory, mental health or intellectual impairment.

The types of works allowable under the scheme include the provision of access ramps, downstairs toilet facilities, stair-lifts, accessible showers, adaptations to facilitate wheelchair access, extensions, and any other works which are reasonably necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability. The level of grant aid available is determined on the basis of gross household income and shall be between 30%-95% of the approved cost of the works to a maximum of €30,000. The grant is available to households whose gross annual household income does not exceed €60,000.

MOBILITY AIDS GRANT SCHEME

The Mobility Aids Housing Grant is available to cover a basic suite of works to address mobility problems, primarily, but not exclusively, associated with ageing. The works grant aided under the scheme include the following: - Grab-rails, Access ramps, Level access showers, Stair-lifts and other minor works deemed necessary to facilitate the mobility needs of a member of a household. The effective maximum grant is €6,000 or 100% the cost of the works, whichever is the lesser and the grant is available to households whose gross annual household income does not exceed €30,000.

The following Energy Saving/Warmer Homes Grants are available from Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI):

1. BETTER ENERGY HOMES GRANT

The spirit and objective of the scheme is to assist homeowners in improving the energy efficiency of their homes.

Who is Eligible: Homeowners of homes built before 2006. (Homes constructed after 2006 are not eligible-these should meet the required Building Standards at the time)

The Funder: The Grants are payable by Sustainable Energy Ireland (SEAI)

What Grants are payable: Cash Grants for

- Insulation in Attic €300
- Wall Cavity €300
- Internal Dry-lining €1200-€1800-€2,400 depends on whether apartment or middle house or end or semi detached or detached
- External Insulation €2,750 or €4,500-€6,000 depend on whether apartment or middle house or end or semi detached or detached
- Heating Controls upgrade €700
- Solar Thermal €1,200
- Bonus for a 3rd measure is €1,200 and bonus for 4th measure is €100
- Obligatory BER certificate €50

Where expenditure is lower that the amounts above the lower amount is payable. Any expenditure in excess of the Grant amounts must be borne by the homeowner. **Who does the work:** All Works must be undertaken by an SEAI registered Contractor.

Who employs the Contractor: The homeowner engages the Contractor. SEAI has developed a Buyers Guide to provide buyers with the best information and service from their chosen contractor.

SEAI has a list of Registered Contractors.

Who employs the BER Assessor: The Homeowner employs the BER assessor.

Standards to be met: There are technical standards to meet. Registered SEAI Contractors will be aware of these standards.

Homeowners will require their MPRN number (Electricity Meter Point Reference number which is at the top of electricity bills)

Completed applications to be returned on line or by post to Better Energy Homes Programme, The Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland, PO Box 119, Cahirciveen, Co Kerry.

The Approval process: Where applications are approved approval will issue in the case of on line applications, immediately and in the case of postal application, within 20 working days.

The Approval process is in the form of a Grant Offer and it requires to be formally accepted by returning the Acceptance of Offer form within 30 days. Once accepted it remain valid for 6 months.

Getting the Works done:

The key steps include:

- A Declaration of works
- A Formal Contract
- Organise the works
- Pay the Contractor
- Have the BER Assessor undertake the BER assessment and complete the BER DOW Certificate

Claiming the Grant:

- Complete the request
- Declarations to be signed
- BER to be submitted
- Retain all invoice and receipts
- An inspection of the works

Paying the Grant: Grants are payable to homeowners bank account.

2. WARMER HOMES SCHEME

This scheme funds energy improvements to the homes of vulnerable people in, or at risk of, energy poverty.

The aim is to make their homes warmer, healthier and cheaper to run. It is available to homeowners who own and live in their homes.

- The Home must be built before 2006
- The homeowner must in receipt of certain Social Welfare payments as follows:
 - > Fuel Allowance as part of the National Fuel Scheme
 - > Job Seekers Allowance for over six months and have a child under seven years of age
 - > Family Income Supplement
 - > One-Parent Family Payment
 - Domiciliary Care Allowance (with effect from January 1 2018)
- The homeowner must not have received works previously under the Warmer Homes Scheme

Over 125,000 homeowners have had energy efficiency measures carried out to their homes since 2001.

What does energy poverty mean?

According to the government's Energy Poverty Strategy, a household may be energy poor if it is unable to afford an acceptable standard of warmth and energy services. In Ireland if a household spends more than 10% of their disposable income on energy costs it is considered energy poor.

There are a number of home energy improvements offered as part of this scheme:

Attic insulation, Cavity wall insulation, Draught proofing, Lagging jackets, Low energy light bulbs and Energy advice.

The following measures are not available under the scheme: external wall insulation, internal drylining, central heating, window/door replacements and renewable technologies.

Warmer Homes Scheme measures are carried out at no cost to the homeowner

How the grant works

Subject to eligibility for the scheme the next steps are:

- 1. The homeowner will be contacted by a surveyor acting on behalf of SEAI who will arrange a time to visit the home.
- 2. During the visit the surveyor will assess the home and ascertain the measures which may be required.
- If eligible works are identified, then an SEAI appointed installer will be assigned to the home. The installer will contact the homeowner to arrange a time to install the measures.
- Works are completed the time taken to complete the works may vary from a number of days to a number of weeks. Installers offer a two year guarantee on all works carried out.
- 5. A sample of recipient homes will be inspected to ensure that the completed works meet the required specification and standards.
- 6. All homes receive a post works Building Energy Rating (BER).

Please note waiting times are impacted by the demand for the scheme. At present average waiting times are in the region of six to nine months. The scheme is eligible for cofunding from the European Union.

How to apply

To apply for the Better Energy Warmer Homes Scheme, you will need to submit:

- 1. The application form, completed and signed by the homeowner. It should also be signed and stamped by an official of the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection.
- 2. Proof of ownership of your home. Provide a copy of one of the following with your name and address clearly shown:
 - > Homeowners home insurance policy (not a quote)
 - > Homeowners mortgage statement
 - > The title deeds to homeowners property
 - > Homeowners Local Property Tax notification letter, supported by a utility bill.
- 3. If person is on on Job Seekers Allowance for over six months and have a child under seven years of age, a copy of your child's birth certificate must be submitted.

GARDA TEXT ALERT

Gardai will provide a Text to each registered Community Contact and they in turn will forward the information by text or email to all members of their community group. Text Alert creates a greater sense of security, reducing burglary & theft offences.



PERSONAL SAFETY

Older persons are subjected to burglary and thefts as frequently as the rest of the population. A lifetime of experience coupled with the ageing process can make older persons feel vulnerable and more fearful of becoming a victim of crime.

Good neighbours are a vital component in crime prevention and reducing the fear of crime. This is particularly important for the older person. They will keep an eye on their neighbours' property and call regularly to make sure everything is safe and secure.

You too can be a good neighbour, its all about awareness of what is happening around you and keeping a friendly lookout for the person near you. Consider joining a Community Alert or Neighbourhood Watch scheme if there is one in your area. These schemes may be able to assist in getting funding for various security systems available for qualifying older persons. Your local Garda station or Garda Crime Prevention Officer can provide more information on the setting up of such schemes.

HOME SECURITY

- Fit a door viewer and a door chain/limiter. These will allow you to safely check callers and retain control over security.
- Front and rear doors and windows should be kept locked day and night.
- Keep a list of emergency numbers that you can refer to quickly, if required, e.g. family, neighbours, Gardaí, medical or fire service.
- If you have a mobile phone, ensure that you have emergency contact numbers recorded under the ICE (In Case of Emergency) system.
- Keep a Personal Information Pack on your fridge (Age Action Ireland, tel: 01-4756989, for further information).
- Number your house clearly so that emergency services can find you quickly if necessary.

DISTRACTION BURGLARY

A distraction burglary is where a bogus caller to your home gains entry on a pretext/lie or creates a diversion so that an accomplice can sneak in separately.

Unfortunately, older persons are frequently targeted with this crime.

Bogus callers will say anything to get into your home -

"There's been an accident, can I call an ambulance?" "I've broken down, can I use your phone?"

"I've had a fall, could I have a glass of water"

"I'm from the council, there's a burst main, I need to turn off your supply"

Some will keep you talking at the front door while their accomplice sneaks in the back door. In all cases you need to be wary of strangers calling to your home.

Take precautions -

- Do not open the door to anyone before you've checked who it is and what they want. Use your door viewer and chain/limiter.
- Check identification, where appropriate.
- Do not leave strangers unattended at your doorstep.
- Ensure your back door is locked when you answer a call at the front door.

CASH/FINANCIAL SECURITY

Thieves and burglars love nothing better than cash. It is therefore important to observe the following:

- Do not keep large amounts of cash in your home. Use banks, building societies, credit unions, post offices etc.
- Keep all credit/debit cards in a secure location as well as financial statements, records etc.
- Out-of-date cards should be destroyed.
- Do not give your credit/debit card passwords to anybody.
- When out and about, avoid carrying large sums of money.

PROPERTY

Mark your property and record serial numbers where appropriate. UV markers and/or special etching tools can be used. Use a unique reference number such as your initials and date of birth. Seek advice about marking high value property e.g. antiques, paintings etc.

It is also a good idea to photograph your property. Photograph items such as jewellery against a ruler or some other common household item (for size reference). If taking digital photos, keep copies of your property photographs elsewhere other than on your own computers.

SCAMS

Be alert to con artists. Don't fall for anything that sounds too good to be true.

- In general, do not give out personal information over the phone unless you know whom you are talking to. This also applies to internet communication.
- Do not give out your credit/debit card, bank account, social welfare numbers etc. to anyone over the phone.
- Do not leave old and no longer relevant financial statements lying around. Shred as appropriate.
- Be wary of bogus trades people calling to your door and advising you that your roof needs to be repaired, gutters are blocked and need to be cleared, trees need to be felled etc.

OUT AND ABOUT

- Avoid travelling alone, where possible. Go with family, friends or neighbours.
- If travelling by car, keep all doors locked. Be alert when parking and getting in/out of your vehicle.

THEFT STOP

TheftStop is a farm theft prevention initiative that has been developed by IFA in partnership with An Garda Síochána. Protecting your farm and valuable machinery has never been more important. Theft of agricultural vehicles and machinery has seen increases of 40% in recent years. Theft Stop provides members with a unique Security ID. The member then marks their machinery and equipment with this ID.

A comprehensive database will be maintained of all stolen equipment for members to view online. Theft Stop will also communicate with members in the event of farm machinery theft.

COMMUNITY SMOKE ALARMS SCHEME

The cost of purchasing the alarm is funded by the Department of Environment, Heritage and Local Government while all other costs are funded locally.

The importance of having a working smoke detector fitted cannot be over emphasised. Most deaths caused by house fires can be prevented if a working smoke alarm is installed. On average 46 people die in fires nationally each year.

Statistics show that 20% of households do not have a working smoke alarm installed. Smoke alarms can save lives.

Under the Scheme, Local Authorities, with the assistance of the voluntary sector, identify vulnerable households, including the elderly and people with disabilities, where no smoke alarms are fitted. The local authority arranges for the supply and where necessary the local community and voluntary group will arrange the installation of two ten-year self-contained smoke alarms. The scheme is facilitated by the Social Inclusion Unit with the assistance of the Fire Departments of Local Authorities.

FIRE SAFETY IN THE HOME

Home Fire Safety, Prevent a fire occurring:

Open Fires

- · Always keep a spark guard in front of an open fire.
- Use a secure fire guard when children are in the room.
- Avoid banking fires too high.
- If you have a chimney fire call the fire brigade.

Portable Heaters

- Keep portable heaters away from curtains and furniture.
- Keep portable heaters away from draughts
- Never move a gas or oil heater when it is in use.
- · Never refill a hot oil heater.
- Never use a portable heater for drying clothes.
- Respect electricity

- Check flexes for signs of wear regularly and replace if necessary.
- Don't run flexes under carpets or rugs where they can be damaged.
- Replace blown fuses with one of the correct rating.
- Don't overload sockets one socket, one plug is a safe rule.
- Get a qualified electrician to carry out repairs.
- Follow the manufacturers instructions for electric blankets.
- Use socket covers if there are children in the house.

Gas Appliances

- Always keep gas cylinders upright and switch off at the regulator when not in use.
- Have adequate ventilation in all rooms where gas heaters are used.
- Check flexible hoses regularly for signs of wear and have them replaced.
- Store gas cylinders in the open air.
- If you suspect a leak, do not switch on lighting or any electrical appliance, ventilate the area, switch off the gas at source, contact your gas supplier.

Cooking

- Never hang cloths directly over cookers or hobs.
- Turn pot handles inwards on the hob.
- Do not wear loose sleeves while cooking.
- Use a thermostatically controlled chip pan.
- Never overfill a chip pan.
- Never leave a chip pan unattended.

Smoking

- Use proper ashtrays on a firm base.
- Last thing at night check that a smouldering cigarette has not fallen into seating or onto carpets.
- Never, never, never smoke in bed.

Children

- Never leave children alone in the house
- Use secure fire guards in front of open fires.
- Never allow children to throw anything on an open fire.
- Keep children clear of the cooker when you are using it.
- Switch off and unplug appliances when not in use.
- Use child proof socket covers.
- · Keep matches out of reach of children.

CALLING THE FIRE BRIGADE

Dial 112

When your call is answered you will speak to an operator who will ask you which service you require i.e. Garda, Ambulance, Fire Brigade or Coast Guard. Once you say you require the Fire Brigade the operator will transfer you to the Fire Brigade Communications Centre in Dublin.

You will be asked a series of questions by the Operator in order for the following information to be collected:

- · What is on fire?
- · What is the address of the premises?
- · What is your Eircode?

- What is your phone number?
- Are there any persons in the building?
- Is evacuation in progress?
- What type of building is on fire?
- Are there any hazards in or around the building?
- · Other information as relevant.

It is not necessary for you to remember any of the above questions. It is, however, important that you:

- · Stay calm
- · Listen carefully to the operator
- Speak slowly and clearly
- Only finish the call when the operator tells you.

You may feel that the call is taking too long because of the questions that are being asked but be assured that as soon as the address is received by the operator the nearest available Fire Crews are dispatched immediately and the operator is just gathering further important information from you to pass on to the nearest available responding fire crews.

ICE (IN CASE OF EMERGENCY)

Many mobile phones have a dedicated ICE contact information function, where the number of a next-of-kin can be added. This will enable first responders, such as fire officers and police officers, as well as hospital personnel, to contact the next of kin of the owner of a mobile phone to obtain important medical or support information (the phone must be unlocked and working).
